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Every time I hear something about Prague I remember my school time spent there. Those were really good days. When I graduated, one friend of mine said: The good part of your life has just finished; now get ready for the hardest part. I fully agree.

Studying in a foreign country is the best experience someone can get. AAU was totally what I have dreamed about: open minded professors you can count on whenever you'd like to talk about an issue, different people from all around the world with different stories, and different kind of studying approaches which I liked the most. Studying law in many schools can be boring, but in AAU was different story. I have always remembered my exam in Property Law when Mr. As you explained that even though my friend and I had different answers, we both had the true answer, meaning we both argued the goal we are defending. He added: Both of you had arguments that are supportive and reliable, and there is no totally right and totally wrong person (answer); there is a good and not so good lawyer.

Even though I currently work something different than I studied, the team and intercultural work that I have learned to practice at AAU are everyday activities. The Cabinet of the Minister of Foreign Affairs is an institution within an institution, a place where the lights stay on until late in the night, where there are no weekends, and sometimes not even time for daily breaks.
